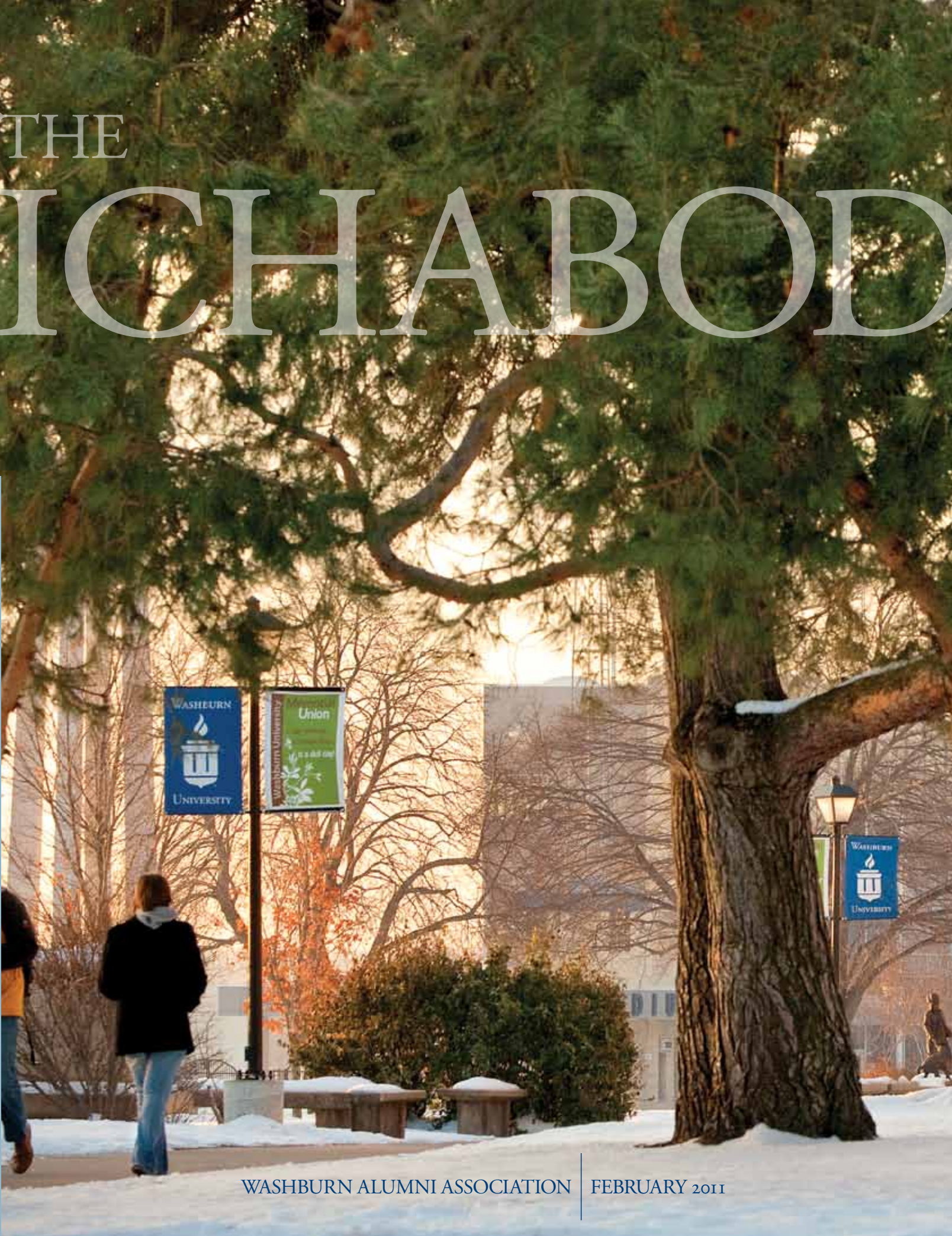
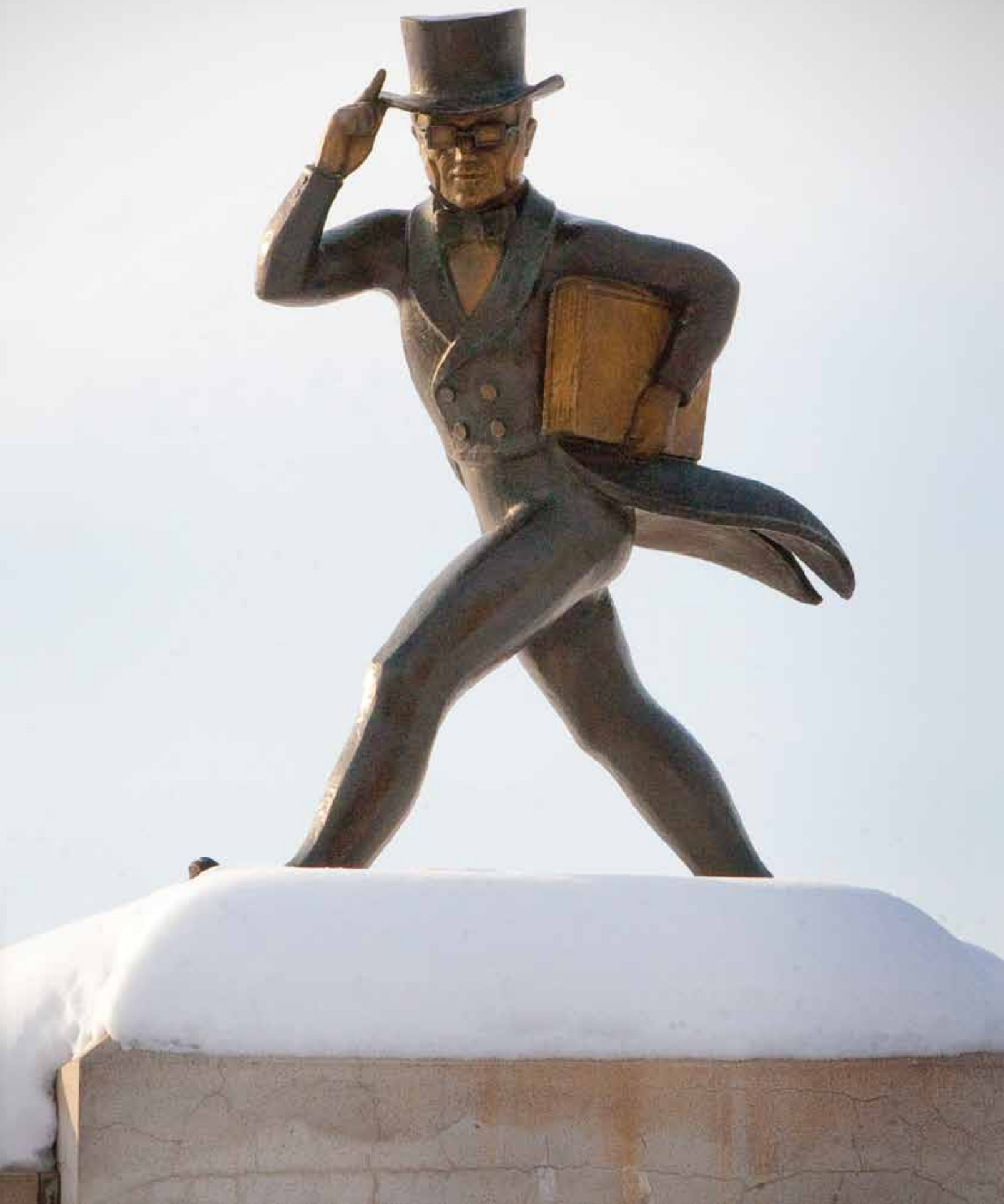

FROM the PRESIDENT


Universities provide many benefits to their communities. Borne out of a necessity to create an educated citizenry, universities and other post-secondary institutions seek to provide individuals with opportunities to match their natural gifts with societal needs. It is our privilege to provide a gateway to this preferred future for Kansans and others from around the world.

This mission is highlighted in Washburn's strategic plans. We are working closely with our community leadership to identify needs and then create new educational programs. Examples include the School of Law Centers for Excellence, our allied health programs in occupational health assistant and sonography, the master of science in nursing degree, the School of Business' certificate in entrepreneurship, bioscience initiatives in the College of Arts and Sciences and the industrial maintenance program at Washburn Tech.

This issue highlights the School of Nursing, which has nearly doubled its undergraduate student enrollment during the past decade and has more than 100 students enrolled in the master's program to become nurse practitioners or clinical nurse leaders. Recently, the School was awarded a federal grant to begin the Transatlantic Dual Degree in Nursing Program, one of only two U.S. nursing schools to receive the award in seven years. I hope you enjoy reading more about TADD and the upcoming proposal for a doctorate in nursing practice degree.

Connections with the community also occur through our Washburn Alumni Association and the Washburn University Foundation. These highly successful organizations provide alumni and their families with financial support, social connections and great ongoing communication about Washburn. Always busy, the Alumni Association hosted more than 50 events in 2010.

Since Washburn was founded in 1985, the value of teaching basic and advanced knowledge in the sciences and humanities has persevered. At Washburn, we will continue to provide high quality general education while emphasizing our relevancy and value by producing graduates who meet the needs of a changing work force.

WASHBURN SCHOOL OF NURSING:

THE NEXT DECADE of PROGRESS

A new initiative in international education debuted at Washburn with the fall 2010 semester. Three nursing students attended classes at Queen's University in Belfast, Northern Ireland. Five European nursing students – one from Queen's University, two from Mikkeli University of Applied Sciences in Finland and two from Szeged University in Hungary – began a year of study at Washburn.

The student exchanges are being funded by a hard-won \$420,000 Transatlantic Double Degree in Nursing Project grant, which takes a giant step beyond traditional student exchange programs by providing nursing students the opportunity to receive two degrees in a streamlined process.

Washburn students in the exchange program will receive baccalaureate nursing or health and science degrees from one of the three participating European Union universities, and EU students will receive nursing or health science degrees from Washburn. The graduates will begin their careers with two nursing degrees, one international and one from their home country, enabling them to work almost anywhere in the world.

Monica Scheibmeir, dean of Washburn's School of Nursing, calls this the forefront of understanding global education. "Early in their professional careers, graduates from this program will be distinguished in their understanding of global health and broad social issues," she said.

The foundation of this opportunity was laid in the late 1990s when Washburn's School of Nursing received a grant for a four- to six-week student exchange program with a consortium of universities in Europe and the United States. The friendly relations formed among the professors, deans and administrators of the respective

universities was an unexpected benefit. Even after the grant ended, Queen's University and Mikkeli University of Applied Sciences continued to exchange students with Washburn.

In 2006, Cynthia Hornberger, then dean of Washburn's School of Nursing, received a telephone call from the dean of Mikkeli University of Applied Sciences.

“She said they would like us to consider applying for a grant through the U.S. Department of Education, and they would apply for an equivalent grant through the EU. It was the same funding source as our previous grant (Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education), but a larger initiative,” Hornberger said. (Hornberger currently serves as special assistant to President Farley.)

Applying for the grant was a major challenge and required many hours of work. Beginning in 2006, nursing professors Ellen Carson and Hornberger worked on the grant application for the U.S. Department of Education while deans and international coordinators in Finland, Northern Ireland and Hungary applied for the European Union grant. They submitted applications in 2007 and again in 2008, but were not selected. Finally, after submitting for the third time, the grant was awarded in 2009.

As soon as news of the grant was received, members of Washburn’s nursing faculty and the deans and international coordinators in Europe began a series of meetings to plan a common curriculum for four core courses. They faced many content and methods issues, including discussions about how to handle differences in student evaluation and testing.


For example, in Finland, students are required to write a thesis, but students write essay tests in Hungary and Ireland. Multiple choice tests are standard at Washburn, partly because the National Council Licensure Examination, a requirement to practice

as a registered nurse in the United States, contains only multiple choice questions. Even the standard American research paper posed issues.

Debbie Isaacson, assistant professor, nursing, teaches one of the classes in which the five EU students enrolled. Isaacson requires students to write a research paper. The EU students received a slightly different assignment – to compare and contrast the way an ethical issue in nursing is handled in their home country with the way it is handled in the United States. Isaacson requires her American students to follow the American Psychological Association format, but the EU students were allowed to use other formats. “We decided to allow this difference since APA is not mandated for State boards,” Isaacson said.

In addition to one-year student exchanges, the TADD grant includes funding for faculty exchanges. Between 2011 and 2013, nine Washburn faculty members are slated to teach for two weeks at one of the three participating EU universities, and nine EU faculty members will teach for two weeks at Washburn. Isaacson hopes to be among the first faculty participants.

Washburn students will have the opportunity to study at a combination of two of the three participating EU universities, and the EU students will have a similar rotation. This past summer, Samantha Grief, Manhattan, Kan.; Adriana Rollins, Topeka; and Roseamaria Magallanez, Emporia, Kan., studied six weeks in Finland and then went on to Northern Ireland to study fall 2010 and spring 2011. In all,

NURSING IN TRANSITION:

2012 and BEYOND

Development of a doctor of nursing practice degree is one of the top priorities listed in Washburn's 150 Forward strategic plan for the School of Nursing.

"It is a natural progression for the nursing profession," said Karen Fernengel, professor, nursing, who is leading a task force on developing a DNP program at Washburn. "Our nurse practitioners who are master's prepared see they would be enriched by a broadened academic preparation."

Monica Scheibmeir, dean of the School of Nursing, said nursing educators are recognizing the need for a practice doctorate in nursing option in addition to research-focused doctoral programs.

"We are responding to a call to action from the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, which represents more than 700 nursing schools," Scheibmeir said.

A 2005 AACN position statement called for moving the current level of preparation for nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse-midwives and certified registered nurse anesthetists from a master's to doctorate program. The authors of the document noted that nursing is moving in the direction of other health professions in the transition to the DNP. Medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, psychology, physical therapy and audiology all require or offer practice doctorates.

Unique to Washburn's DNP curriculum is the inclusion of five master of business administration courses offered through a partnership with the School of Business.

"We will be one of the pioneers with an emphasis on entrepreneurship," Fernengel said. "Traditionally, health care providers have a dearth of business preparation. Our graduates will have an appreciation of finance and marketing and understand how to start, run and maintain a business," she said, noting that the program's 15 business credit hours could be applied to a master of business administration degree. "They will be half way to an MBA," she said.

Fernengel said the nursing task force will present its proposal for the new DNP program to Washburn's Faculty Senate and general faculty in 2011. The proposal will recommend beginning a three-year DNP program in 2012 that will admit master's prepared family and adult nurse practitioners as well as nurses who have master's degrees and would like to obtain their family or adult nurse practitioner education along with a DNP degree. A five-year DNP program that will admit those holding bachelor of science degrees in nursing is projected to start in 2015. 🏃

WASHBURN INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY:

LOOKING INTO the FUTURE

Delivery of superior and rigorous technical programs tops the strategic plan recently adopted by the Washburn Institute of Technology.

“Our ultimate goal is to continue to provide highly qualified faculty and staff at every turn so the student's experience is the very best we can offer,” said Roxanne Kelly.

Kelly joined Kaw Area Technical School as its first dean in 2009, six months after the school affiliated with Washburn University. Located at 5724 SW Huntoon St., the school, now the Washburn Institute of Technology, offers 25 different programs in the areas of construction, health care, human service, technology and transportation.

The Washburn Tech faculty and staff followed a strategic planning process similar to that of Washburn University. In early spring 2010, four teams were formed to gather input from faculty, staff, students, community members and 150 members of program advisory boards. The strategic plan, with a revised mission statement and four strategic elements, was approved by the Washburn Board of Regents in September.

PROGRAMS

The first element calls for a strategy to deliver superior technical programs. Included in this are such goals as increasing enrollment, scholarships, support of non-traditional students and adding online courses. The other three strategic elements focus on students, external relationships and resources.

STUDENTS

The first goal of the Element II is the increase of enrollment to 1500 FTE by 2012, including day, evening and weekend programs. Corresponding goals include increasing the rate of retention and program completions and enhancing the diversity of enrollment.

EXTERNAL RELATIONSHIPS

The third strategic element calls for strengthening external relationships, and this includes plans for increased partnering with Washburn University.

“We want to see more students than ever taking advantage of the associate degree options at Washburn,” Kelly said.


Willie Dunlap, dean, School of Applied Studies, said Washburn began granting credit hours to students completing KATS programs as far back as 1985.

Today students at Washburn Tech can move seamlessly from certificate programs into associate degree programs at Washburn University. For example, 30 credit hours from the Washburn Tech electronic technology program can be applied to a 62-credit hour associate of applied studies degree in industrial technology. Other examples include 24 credit hours in culinary arts transferring into an associate of arts degree in food service, or 32 hours in surgical technology transferring into an associate of science degree in surgical technology. Washburn’s School of Applied Studies also offers a bachelor’s degree in technology administration for those completing technology-based associate degrees.

“They have the equipment and laboratories for the technical courses we don’t have, and we provide the general education courses, so we utilize resources from each campus to the best of our ability,” Dunlap said. “This sharing of resources provides students with quality general and technical education, making them more employable and better at what they do.”

RESOURCES

The fourth element calls for expanding and enhancing human, physical and financial resources.

“As we face budget cuts, we must strive to keep tuition as affordable as possible and keep the most qualified faculty and staff we can,” Kelly said. “The dedication of our faculty and staff to put this plan into motion has been unparalleled in my experience. I see only great things coming, strengthened by our partnership with Washburn.”

Encouraging high school students to consider attending Washburn has become a rewarding way to serve my alma mater. I am also a member of the Washburn Alumni Association board of directors.

In early 2010, I met with Richard Liedtke, executive director of enrollment management, and later with Morgan Boyack, director of admissions, in regard to becoming an admissions representative for Washburn in Colorado since Colorado's continuing growth in high school enrollment makes it a prime place for out-of-state recruitment.

From September to December 2010, I attended numerous high school college fairs and had access to approximately 40,000 students. At these fairs I met many outstanding young men and women. The only problem has been that they have never heard of Washburn, and this spawned a wide range of questions, including "Where is Washburn?" "Are you a four-year school?" "Do you have sports?" "Do you have ROTC?"

There were plenty of parents asking questions too: "How much does Washburn cost?" "Can my son or daughter get resident tuition?" "What kind of residential living does Washburn have?" "Is it secure?"

As I networked with other college admissions representatives, I learned that Washburn is very well positioned due to its small class sizes, emphasis on professors (instead of graduate students) teaching, international exchange programs, master's degree programs, and a key feature — the great campus life and learning experience. A number of parents told me they wished they had gone to smaller schools and that they were very interested in what Washburn had to offer academically and socially.

There have been lighthearted moments. At one fair, a mother and daughter were both interested in Washburn and asked a lot of questions. When I told them the residence



halls are close to all classes and activities, the mother turned to her daughter and said, "See? You don't even need a car!"

As the local admissions adviser, my job has been made much easier with the new Washburn recruitment folder. It is compact, yet contains information to answer the majority of questions and has attractive photographs of campus life.

Many students cruise the Internet checking out various schools, and the updated Washburn website is a valuable tool. We have placed information about Washburn as well as a link to Washburn's website on the Colorado American Legion Boys State website. This gives us access to hundreds of high school junior boys we otherwise would not reach.

During the next few months, I will be meeting with students and counselors at individual schools. Obviously, this is not a one-year project, but I hope, through making our presence known in Colorado, we will see more students from this state at Washburn. I would like to hear from the approximately 1,000 Washburn alumni in Colorado and welcome your help spreading the good news about Washburn.

Canfield, Waltz & Goering

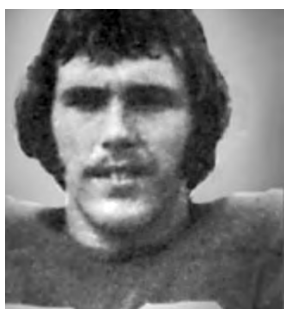

SETTING A NEW STANDARD

At age 23 with roughly one and a half years of work experience under her belt, Billie Jean Bergmann's demographics are not that of a typical scholarship fund donor. However, as a 2009 School of Business graduate, Bergmann, Topeka, is setting a new standard for recent graduates.

Bergmann is leading by example in creating an endowed scholarship fund for business students. The youngest known Washburn graduate to establish a fund of this kind, Bergmann realizes she is the exception to the rule when it comes to contributions from younger alumni. Due to the weight of paying off student loans, starting a career and beginning a family, many young alumni are reluctant to make gifts to their alma mater immediately following graduation.

"Part of the reason I wanted to make this gift was to help inspire gifts from other young alums like me," said Bergmann. "There is an urgent need to provide continued scholarship support for Washburn students, and we have a responsibility to help provide the same type of assistance many of us received as students."

Many younger alumni tend to wait until their mid-30s to make a gift to their alma mater. However, with the rising costs of obtaining an education and decreasing support from local and state governments, gifts of any size from alumni and friends of all ages are becoming more and more essential to Washburn students.

The financial challenges of obtaining an education are fresh in Bergmann's mind. Her scholarship will help students pursuing a degree in business become more attainable.

"The hands-on learning opportunity I experienced at Washburn truly made an impact on my success after graduation. Now in the work force, I am even more appreciative of the exceptional education I received," she said.

Gifts to support students are crucial in providing scholarship assistance, faculty and staff support and maintaining the day-to-day operations of the university. Regardless of age, support from alumni and friends make a difference daily.

"My overall experience at Washburn was made possible because of gracious donors. I felt giving back was the least I could do in return," said Bergmann. 🎓

SAM CROW

Back in 1969, Sam Crow, ba '73, Springfield, Mo., was just your average high school student, dreaming of everything but college. While furthering his education was the farthest thing from his mind, there was still a glimmer of desire in his heart to make something more of himself.

Growing up in Topeka, Crow was familiar with Washburn University. After much contemplation, Crow enrolled at Washburn and began his transformational journey.

While in the Air Force, Crow attended Chapman University in California and earned a master's degree in counseling psychology. In 1985, Crow graduated from Kansas City University of Medicine and Biosciences with a degree in osteopathic medicine.

Since he first set foot in a Washburn classroom, Crow's desire to continue to learn has never faltered. Currently, he serves as a part-time medical director and family practice doctor at St. John's Health System in Springfield, Mo. His career requires him to keep pace with what is new and changing in his field.

Because of their belief in the power of giving back, Crow and his wife, Cheryl (Browne) Crow, ba '73, have established an endowed scholarship fund at Washburn to assist non-traditional students pursuing degrees in medicine. The Crows also want to help students see their potential and talent, just like the professors at Washburn did for Sam when he was a student.

Crow credits much of his success to his experiences at Washburn University.

"My time at Washburn really set me on fire for my future and opened my eyes to the possibilities out there. Who knows what is next for me?" 🙌

STUDENTS BUILD VIDEO GAME TO PROMOTE TOPEKA



Students enrolled in the art department's interactive art and gaming class used virtual world zombies to promote a real-world project. The project, which will be ongoing for the next two years, is a video game developed by students enrolled in the class taught by Azyz Sharafy, associate professor, art.

The game will challenge players to overcome a variety of obstacles, including zombies, to "win" a vision of a new, revitalized downtown Topeka.

Early History of the Washburn Alumni Association

On June 6, 1885, a group of eight recent graduates (five women and three men) met at the home of Mary and Helen “Nellie” Sherrill to form the Washburn College Alumni Association.

George Perry, who was selected as the temporary president, recognized the constitution committee and the group adopted what that committee presented. They elected officers, but postponed the election of the executive committee four days, when many alumni would be on campus for commencement activities.

At the June 10 meeting in the Rice Hall chapel, the Rev. John Morgan, financial agent, spoke about the influence of alumni on the success of the college. The next order of business was passage of a resolution that each member “endeavor to contribute a certain sum each year for the benefit of Washburn College.” At future meetings, Association members would vote on how they wanted the fund to be used. The secretary was charged to keep a record of the address of each member. Thus began a long tradition of holding the annual meeting in June during commencement week.

At the next annual meeting, held at President Peter McVicar’s residence, members of the WCAA welcomed the four members of the class of 1886. They elected officers for the year and then voted that their annual funds be used to defray the expenses of some students, to be chosen by President McVicar and the Association president. In other business, they established that members not planning to attend could receive minutes and vote for president by mail.

The thick, handwritten book of minutes housed in Washburn’s archives is fascinating to read, although some of the handwriting is difficult to decipher. The first

constitution, amendments and bylaws are recorded in this book, as well as a list of the graduates for each year through 1913, with their address changes. Other Alumni Association records held by the archives include a commencement attendance record, subsequent constitutions, publications, numerous clippings and photographs.

A small treasurer’s book for the College Alumnae Club is one interesting item. Listing members and expenses for 1912-16, this women’s group seems to be separate from the WCAA and was perhaps a social organization in the Topeka area.

The WCAA published its first alumni directory in the *Helianthus* yearbook ’96, and subsequent directories were published periodically as an issue of the *Washburn College Bulletin*, published by the College. The last *Bulletin* directory was published in the 1929, and the next directory was not published by the Alumni Association until 1965. This hampers research of the many alumni who graduated between those years. During that 35-year time span, addresses of alumni likely changed several times, and the Association surely lost track of more than a few graduates.

Although the financial constraints of the 1930s and the near closure of Washburn may have hampered the growth of the WCAA, Washburn reached out especially to the Kansas alumni during its 75th anniversary celebrations in 1940. President Philip King and other officials made trips to alumni groups around the state to include them in the celebration and also to give presentations about the continuing financial campaign.

After the city of Topeka breathed new life into the College and it became Washburn University, interest in reorganizing the alumni grew. In 1948, a new constitution was adopted, and Cecil Peterson, ba ’34, was unanimously

elected president, succeeding Ward Martin, jd '33. The new constitution officially changed the Association's name to Washburn Alumni Association and changed some of its functions. An alumni fund was created, and plans were made to present awards to distinguished graduates during commencement week. The first Distinguished Service Awards were given to four alumni in 1949.

Also in 1949, the board of directors officially adopted an alumni seal. As reported in the April 1949 Washburn University Bulletin, the seal "shows Mr. Ichabod spanning two hemispheres, to indicate that we have alumni around the world. The date, 1885, was when the first official Alumni Association was created."

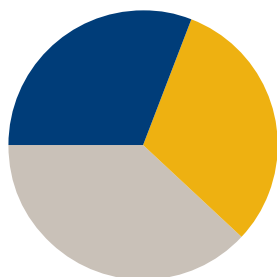

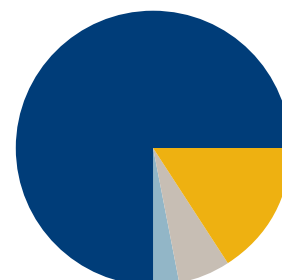


Where Alumni Live

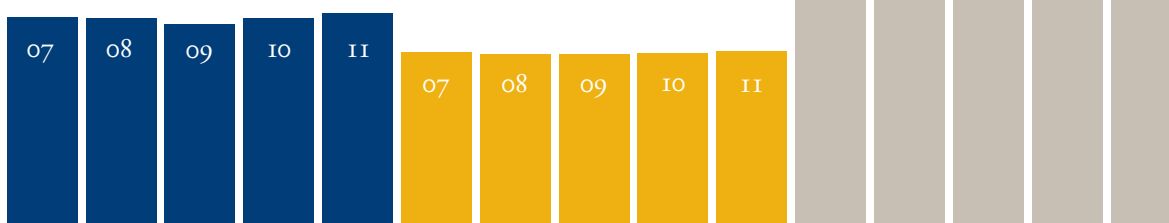
How Membership Dues Are Spent
